# **Speaker Tips**

Having speakers at your virtual event? Here are tips and tricks to set your speakers up for success.



We want their space to authentically reflect their personality while not distracting the audience  $\rightarrow$ 



#### **Background Environment**

Ask them to declutter the space and remove items they wouldn't want people to see.



#### Lighting

Ample lighting ensures your speakers look their best and improves clarity of the video. For the best results, they should always be facing the light.



#### Sound

Have them remind their families, roommates, and pets to keep it down to minimize distracting noise.





#### **Eye Contact**

Stress eye contact with the camera and suggest the camera to be at eye level. If they're using a script or notes, they should have it on the same screen as their camera.



#### Rehearsals

Provide and require speakers to attend rehearsal to understand the process, technology (including any software needed), and overall flow.



**Day-of** Also require them to arrive at least 10-15 minutes prior to their presentation



Presenting on camera might seem strange, especially if your speakers thrive on audience reactions∕ interactions, but a few helpful reminders and additional tips →



#### Clothing

Be specific in how you want them to appear, otherwise, tell them to wear what they normally would to a speaking engagement.



#### Personality

They may need to work harder to appear dynamic on screen. It will feel like an exaggerated version of themself, but don't worry, it's not.



**Positioning** Remind them to center themselves in the middle of the screen.







The technology may be the biggest wild card in all of this, so relay these steps to reduce the possibilities of hiccups  $\rightarrow$ 



### **Internet Connection**

Hard wired internet is preferred; stable and robust WIFI should be required. Make sure they kick families, roommates, and pets off the WIFI to increase their connection's quality and stability.



#### Device

Ask that they avoid using older devices, if possible. Look into offering speaker kits which include higher quality cameras and microphones.



## Virtual Background

Virtual backgrounds can be fun, but it's a fine line between fun and inappropriate. If you're allowing virtual backgrounds, ask to see them in advance.



## Sound

Remind them using headphones will help drown out background noise as well as help their voice carry through their device better.
